Step One - Identify a research Q

Starting with the right question is crucial. Follow the process below to get yours right.

- 1 What problem needs 'fixing' in your classroom.
- 2 Find the root cause of this problem.
- 3 What strategy do you intend to try out?
- 4 Is this strategy likely to impact on the root cause?

All 110 pupils, or only certain groups?
Are they reading effectively?
Do they know how to structure their answers?
110 pupils aren't attempting 6-10 mark GCSE Science questions.

Is it a teacher issue or 'grouped' pupils?
Is it only Science questions or do other subjects have the same issue?
