of experimental methods and a mixed method approach for data collection. Meanwhile, previous research mainly studied university students who were learning English as a second or foreign language; hence, we also welcome research examining first language writers and students who are learning a second or foreign language other than English. We believe for the study of the complex phenomenon like academic writing, no single method or tool can suffice. Therefore, we strongly recommend a more creative perspective in data collection and analyzing and interpreting academic writing. Papers can present quantitative data analyses based on experimental design or qualitative data analyses stemmed from more ethnographic oriented research. Systematic review studies are also welcome. We encourage contributions related but not restricted to the following topics:

- 1 Cognitive processes in academic texts: planning, composing, and revisions and student writers' individual differences.
- 2 Metacognition and self regulation in academic texts: planning, composing, and revisions and student writers' individual differences.
- 3 Motivation and self efficacy in academic texts: planning, composing, and revisions and student writers' individual differences.
- 4 Linguistic and rhetorical choices, identity construction, and disciplinary knowledge construction.
- 5 Student writers' textual production, peer feedback, and interactions with discourse communities.
