



## Art History Essay Example

Christianity art is usually produced in most cases to supplement, portray and illustrate in a more tangible manner principles behind Christianity. Nearly all Christian groupings either use or have used before art in some aspect. The style, prominence and representations have been found to be changing with time but most of the representations have mainly been those of Jesus ministry as well as in some few cases, the Old Testament. In Roman Catholicism, Anglicanism and eastern orthodoxy, saints are also depicted in art images. The first Christian image to be preserved dates back in 70 AD.

Earliest examples of Christian art are found in the catacombs. It is from the funerary art found in the catacombs that much of the revelation as to who the early Christians were is revealed. Early Christians used to employ artists to decorate tombs in an attempt to communicate some messages. They were seeking to even take the light of the gospel in to what might be perceived as a dark and cold chamber where their dead lay awaiting the resurrection day. Catacomb images have been noted for their clarity of purpose. The understanding of the pagan art is imperative when making an attempt to interpret the meaning of the Christian images.

Paleochristian art adhered to most of the classical rules of expression that governed figurative arts. Thus the understanding of the pagans expressed the art helps to unlock the christian images meaning. (Guru, 1995). Frescoes, inscriptions, sculptures and Graffiti in catacombs As some of these have been lost forever in some cases, they have with time been deteriorating. Sculptures have however stood the test of time since they are carved from the stones. Statues, sarcophagi and inscriptions are some of the sculptures found in the catacombs.

Sarcophagus is an antiquity's marble coffin that ranged in size from those of married couples to infants size. Though some have on their four lateral panels sculptured reliefs, others were limited to either the frontal panel or the three panels. The sculptured images from the pagan sarcophagi usually represented the mythological stories while the Christian ones were used to illustrate the biblical episodes, life of Jesus and in some cases the images of the dead. Most of the statues that are found in the catacombs are mainly those of Jesus representing Him as a good shepherd.

The pagan figure of Orpheus was used as the artistic model that had a lamb on the shoulder and a flute on the side. Though christians never adorned the catacombs with the statues that the Christians had, they did eventually adopt Orpheus as a representation of Good Shepherd, Jesus. inscriptions on the other hand are often characteristics. They are either engravings of either symbols or signs or they can be text that is written in Latin or Greek (Saoud, 2004). Graffiti which is very common in catacombs dates back in 2000 years ago. Unlike the modern christians who use spray paint, early Christian
