## 6TH GRADE MATH

**MEASURES OF CENTER**

DATA SET: 11, 9, 7, 3, 5, 2, 4, 9, 61

**MEAN**

Mean is the average.

STEP 1: Add all numbers in the data set.

STEP 2: Divide by the number of numbers.

EXAMPLE:  $11+9+7+3+5+2+4+9+61 = 114$   
 $114 \div 9 = 12.6$

**MODE**

The **MODE** is the value that appears most often in a data set.
