#### Fine-tune Auditory Discrimination Skills      Sound Identification

Play a sound game! Create a sound behind a board/divider. Ask the children to identify the sound. Suggestions: clap your hands, tear a piece of paper, cut paper with scissors, sharpen a pencil, snap your fingers, knock on wood, staple paper, click a camera, ring a bell, pop a balloon, bounce a ball. *Warning: I banged two blocks together, one paper, and rocks to my dismay. The children insisted creating that sound during activity time... For the next round.*



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### Auditory Processing

#### Gross Discrimination Skills

Animal Sounds  
created by the teacher.

Tell the children that the animals are going for a bus ride! Sing the song: The Wheels on the Bus. After the first verse sing about the animal sound! (e.g., The dog on the bus goes, "woof, woof, woof." The pig on the bus goes, "oink, oink, oink." ... All through the town!)
